Social media policy statement



Social media is now an established form of communication and can be a useful tool, especially when circumstances demand speedy communication which people can easily access from virtually anywhere.

While Boston Borough Council welcomes use of its social media sites for comment, suggestion, even constructive criticism, it is not appropriate for service requests or to make a complaint.

For speedy service responses please continue to email info@boston.gov.uk and for proper handling of complaints please continue to email feedback@boston.gov.uk. When using our social media channels please bear in mind some straightforward and common-sense rules.

We reserve the right to remove, block or unfollow any accounts which break our guidelines. The following list is not limited, but includes:

- ensure your posts are not abusive to anyone or overly negative
- be civil, tasteful and relevant
- don't post messages that are unlawful, libellous or defamatory (you must not post anything that makes false or unfair statements that are likely to damage the reputation of a person or organisation), harassing, abusive, threatening, harmful, obscene, profane, sexually oriented or racially offensive
- don't swear
- don't post content copied from elsewhere, for which you do not own the copyright
- don't post the same message, or very similar messages, more than once (also called "spamming")
- don't publicise your, or anyone else's, personal information, such as contact details
- don't advertise products or services
- don't impersonate someone else

If we do remove, block or unfollow you we will review this after 6 months. If appropriate any restrictions will be removed at this point.

We may follow you to assist us in our communication with you.

Pre-election period

In the six-week run up to an election known as 'purdah'- local, general or European - councils have to be very careful not to do or say anything that could be seen in any way to support any political party or candidate. During this time we may post less or not at all so that we are not breaching any protocol or are seen to favour a particular party. We reserve the right to remove political posts during purdah where this may impact on the decision making of the Council and/or the elections.
